

The CCC challenges young men and women 18 to 23 years of age to "hard work, low pay, miserable conditions . . . and more!" The young people learn good work habits and develop a sense of pride in their work and themselves, acquiring valuable job skills at the same time.

After a year in the CCC, many CCC graduates pursue jobs in fields directly related to their work in the Corps; others seek careers in new areas of interest. But no matter what their future plans are, young people graduate from the CCC with increased motivation, responsibility and direction.

CCC graduates are good employees. They wouldn't have graduated otherwise. All they need is an opportunity to demonstrate what they can do for you. Now is the time to join other California businesses and designate some of your entry-level jobs for CCC graduates. You'll be glad you did!

What CCC Graduates Offer

CCC graduates are hard workers.
They are responsible and punctual. They are able to follow directions and accept supervision. They are motivated and willing to learn new skills. Perhaps most important, they have proven themselves to be good employees. You can depend on a CCC graduate.

After a year in the CCC, young people can proudly point to their work experience in many areas including: landscaping, facility maintenance, office work, carpentry, painting, warehouse work, resource conservation, and firefighting.

Additionally, many CCC graduates have specialized training in construction, crew supervision, energy conservation, food service, auto mechanics, and nursery management.






The CCC Challenge

The CCC employs more than 2,000 young people each year. They join for many reasons—to work in the outdoors, take on a challenge, learn new skills, or get a paycheck. In the CCC, young people learn good work habits the old-fashioned way—by working hard. Corpsmembers earn minimum wage, and pay for their housing and meals.

After being hired, corpsmembers must complete the CCC's rigorous two-week training program. Then they may find themselves working in rain, high winds, snow, mud, intense heat, and cold mountain streams, doing whatever they are asked to do. Some decide to quit, leaving only the most dedicated in the program.

In both urban and rural areas, corpsmembers build parks and trails, plant trees, renovate community centers, restore historic structures, improve wildlife habitat, and fight forest fires and floods.

But the CCC is much more than hard work, and more than an 8 to 5 job. While daytime hours are spent on project work, corpsmembers attend academic and career development classes several evenings a week. The CCC also offers promotional opportunities that foster leadership skills.



The CCC's Expectations

The CCC demands a great deal from the young people it hires. Corpsmembers must be on time for work each morning or lose an entire day's pay. They must follow instructions and work steadily throughout the day. Like other employers, the CCC uses frequent performance evaluations to ensure that corpsmembers are doing their jobs and producing the work that is expected.

The CCC is open to young men and women between 18 and 23 years of age, who are California residents and not on probation or parole.

CCC and Employers Working Together

California's business community is working with the CCC to promote the employability of corpsmember graduates through the Corps' Employer Advisory Board.

The CCC also has established community advisory boards throughout the state to actively involve key citizens who can provide ideas, energy and support for the CCC programs in their communities.

CCC Grads . . . Valuable To California Employers

CCC graduates can be found in all segments of the workplace. They are landscapers, sales and office clerks, maintenance workers, firefighters, painters, secretaries, truck drivers, recreation directors, teachers, construction workers, cooks, police officers, computer technicians, park rangers, and more.

Since its start in 1976, more than 40,000 young people have been part of the CCC, the oldest and largest program of its kind in the country.
