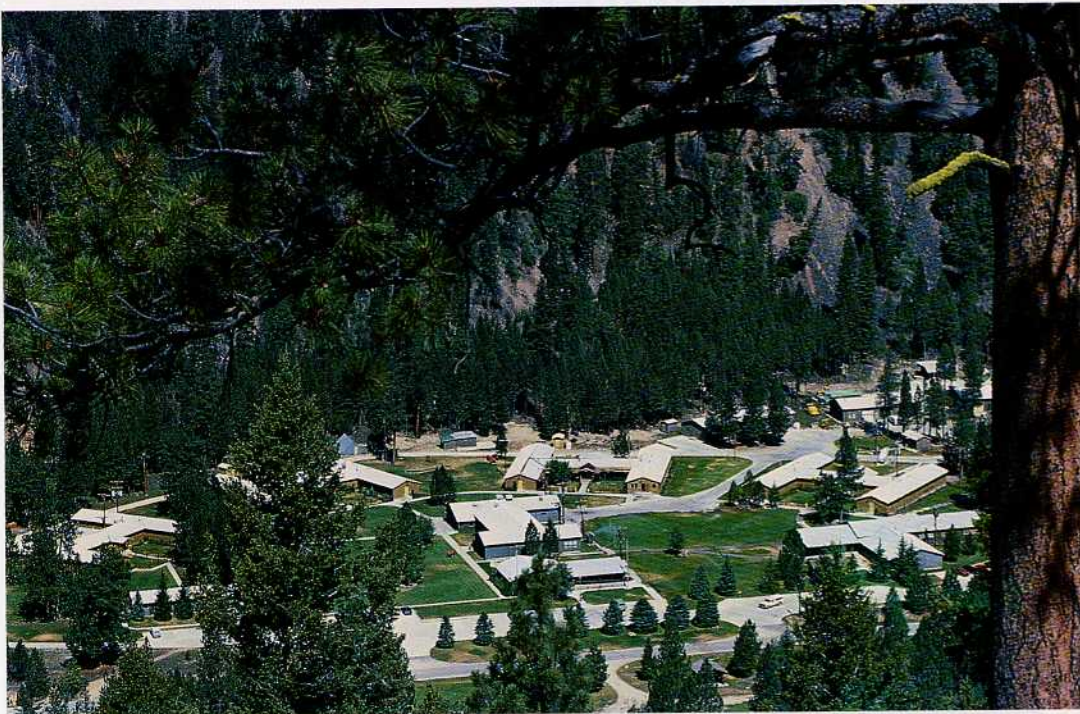

Job Corps offers you ...

..an education

The Center offers an educational program for all students, to provide education in courses from beginning reading through high school diploma. Subjects include **reading, mathematics, language and study skills, consumer education, computer literacy, driver education, advanced general education, health education and orientation to the world of work.** Because many jobs require high school graduation, students can earn the equivalent **GED diploma** or the **high school diploma.** *(Must be 18 years of age for high school diploma.)* While stressing the value of a sound basic education, Center instructors relate studies to vocational training.



The Trapper Creek Job Corps Civilian Conservation Center was opened in January 1966 and offers a vocational/educational training program for disadvantaged young men and women between the ages of 16 and 22. The Center is operated by the **Bitterroot National Forest, Forest Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture** under a joint agreement with the **U.S. Department of Labor**. The young men and women who enroll in this program live at the Center in comfortable living

quarters. There are good opportunities for recreation. Guidance and counseling services are also available.

All instruction and training courses held at the Center are carefully planned to meet the needs of each individual. Vocational and educational classes are balanced to take care of individual needs. Students progress at their own pace and the best possible instructional materials are available.

An opportunity to fight forest fires during the summer may be offered to students who are at least 18 years old. Being a member of a fire-fighting crew will broaden both the training and work experiences for student volunteers.

The outlook for students leaving the Job Corps is bright. **Placement** for graduates available for placement has been maintained well above 80% with students going into jobs, entering the Armed Forces, or going back to school.

Every effort is made to insure that each student who leaves Trapper Creek has had the opportunity to receive quality vocational training in the area of their choice, the chance to improve their basic education (hopefully completing their GED, and high school) and that their counselor will be able to coordinate a job or other placement for them.

Job Corps also means a lot more than just vocational and educational training. Students learn how to be responsible adults and good citizens. While at Trap-

per Creek they are expected to attend all their scheduled classes as well as keep their living area and the rest of the Center clean and orderly. They must abide by all the Center's rules, many of which the students help to formulate.

They are considered as adults and must take full responsibility for their own actions and behavior.

Comfortable living quarters are assigned to each student in a dormitory. Each dorm has its own TV set and a lounge for free time relaxation. Excellent medical, dental, and mental health services are available to all students. All clothing for work and dress is provided. All meals served in the Center's dining hall are well-balanced and tasty. Some volunteer activities are both interesting and educational. These would include classes on how to survive in wilderness areas, physical training classes, hobbies, and being an official in the student government. In addition, students are given opportunities to participate in trips to interesting places away from the Center.

After 6 months, students are eligible for 12 days of home leave. There is a **monthly allowance of \$40**, which may be **increased to \$100** if performance meets standard expectations. When the Job Corps training has been completed or satisfactory performance has been maintained for 6 months, a student is eligible for a **readjustment allowance of \$75 to \$100 for every month** of service depending upon their length of stay.



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
