




WORKING FOR WISCONSIN

Corps of the 1930s,
Wisconsin established the
WCC in 1983.



The WCC provides a great opportunity for young people to work and learn valuable skills while enhancing and improving the state's natural resources.

he work is hard, but the variety is unbeatable. WCC corps members plant trees, build hiking and ski trails, construct park shelters and benches, weatherize buildings, preserve trout streams and historical buildings, battle forest fires, and clean up after floods-and that's just for starters. Most of the work is outdoors and doesn't stop for bad weather.

he WCC works statewide.
At any one time, about 50 crews are working at locations throughout the state. Each crew is sponsored for one year by a government agency, non-profit organization, or a combination of either. The sponsor provides the projects, materials, and transportation; the WCC provides training, wages, Worker's Compensation, supervision, and safety equipment.

he WCC offers opportunities for young adults. Applicants must be 18 to 25 years old, unemployed, and Wisconsin residents. Corps members are paid minimum wage and, after twelve months of service, can receive a tuition voucher or a cash bonus. During their service, corps members receive training in first aid, wildfire control, and a wide variety of light construction and conservation skills. They also build dependable job skills and increase their self-confidence.
